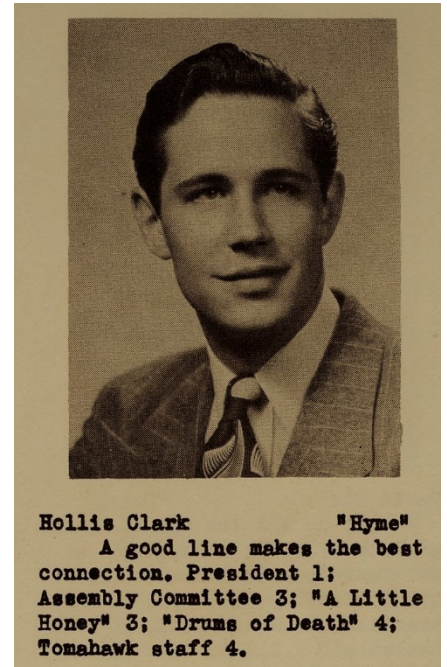


**Hollis Hammond Clark Jr.**, son of Hollis Hammond Sr. (1904-1972) and Gertrude Eunice (Lewis) (1902-1984) Clark was born 28 March 1930, Perry, Shiawassee County, Michigan. He graduated in 1948 from Okemos High School and furthered his education at Michigan State College (became MSU in 1955), receiving a DVM degree, doctor of veterinary medicine, in May 1954. Hollis served as a 1st Lieutenant in the US Army for two years, 1954-1956, stationed in Oklahoma.

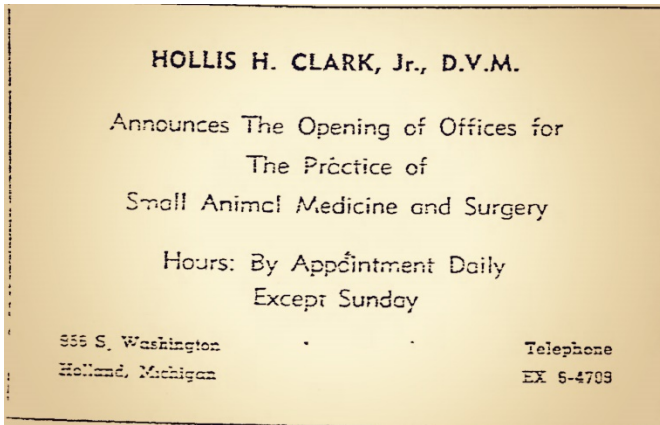
Hollis father was also a veterinarian. Hollis settled in the early 1960's in Holland, Ottawa County, Michigan where he opened what became a thriving veterinary practice and also dabbled in local politics. He was a candidate for 3rd Ward Councilman in 1965 and successfully elected. In 1975 Hollis and 3 other veterinarians authored a well received book, "Instructions for Veterinary Clients."

Dr. Hollis H. Clark Jr., incumbent, 34-year-old doctor of veterinary medicine, was named early in January to the third ward post to succeed Harold R. Volkema who was elected to the state senate. A native of Lansing, Dr. Clark is a graduate of Michigan State University and spent two years as first lieutenant in the U. S. Army at Fort Sill, Okla. He spent 1½ years at the Veterinary Medical Center in Flint before coming to Holland seven years ago. He is married and has two children. He is an Episcopalian, is president of the Holland Community Concert Association and is active in Holland Community Theatre.

Dr. and Mrs. Hollis H. Clark and two daughters of Flint are living at 956 Washington Ave. Dr. Clark is a veterinarian.

Rev. David S. Evans read the double-ring service.

Pearl embroidery marked the Queen Anne collar of the bride's robes. A calot of satin, edged in rows of folded illusion encrusted with pearls, held her veil of silk illusion. Nancy carried snow white roses and Caladium foliage tied with lace and double-faced satin with tiny white buds in streamers.
