Okemos Sprint King Has Rivals in the 'Circuit'

Some of the top action in the second annual Ingham County league-Capital Circuit inter-league track meet Monday evening will be in the two dash events.

Although Dick Ewing of Okemos is the defending champion in the two sprints, the Ingham county league speedster is sure to have plenty of competition from Everett's Jimmy Diederichs and Ray Vandersteen of Grand Ledge.

In the inter-league meet, which is sponsored by The State Journal and will be run at Michigan State college starting at 5:30 p. m., the first three-place winners in the two league meets are formed into league squads. Last year the circuit won the first annual meet.

Entering the state Class C meet today as the favorite to win two individual titles, Ewing has not been beaten this year and holds two victories over Diederichs. The Everett sprinter nosed out Vandersteen in both dashes in the Circuit meet Wednesday. All three have been consistently under 10.5 seconds in the century.

The Circuit is expected to get an early lead against the eight-team Ingham County league by dominating two of the field events. With three Howell shotputters all over the 40-foot mark, the Circuit could slam the event. Bill Haskins of Haslett won the County title with a heave of 38 feet 3 inches.

With Howell's Carmen Kypke and Everett's George Price and Dick Content in the pole vault, the Circuit could also place one-two-three in this event. The County's top hope to break into the scoring will be Wayne Sober of Williamston who won the County title at 9 feet 9 inches. The Circuit trio all can go over 11 feet.


Haslett's Herbie Hagenbuch of the County squad will be favored to keep his broad jump title he won in the meet last year. Hagenbuch has hit right around the 20-foot mark this year. The County will miss Dee McDonald of Okemos, who will not compete because of a senior trip, in the broad jump. McDonald was second in the meet last year.

The high jump will be a toss up with Boyd Shertzer of Howell and Art Smith of Everett contending with the Ingham County league pair of Dick Fluke of Holt and Hagenbuch. Smith and Shertzer tied for first in the Circuit meet 5 feet 3 inches, and Hagenbuch topped Fluke by an inch when he won the County title 5 feet 5 inches.

I was there in 1964 when the track records went up...

This was the “new” school built in 1960. It was very nice to have a full-sized gym in the new high school, but it lacked history and tradition. With the vision of Jon Overholt '64 and Gary Sturk '64, they proposed a project to The Student Council to fund a display of the Track Records. By no coincidence, the same guys were racking up records themselves and who wouldn't like to see your accomplishments displayed! This was a new display of the hand written records that Coach Baker kept in his desk and Jon, Gary and John were wall mounting the records as they existed in 1964. The record they are hoisting in the picture is for the “880 YARD

RELAY” they set the year before in the Spring of 1963. The record race time of 1:34.4 was quite a story and recounted in the memoir of the German Exchange student, Hans Wiegand '63...but, we didn't know anything about the “old” record they had beaten. When the placard's were in place, we saw names familiar to us students like “Parisian 1963 HIGH HURDLES”, “Belnap Ashley Overholt Turner 1962 ONE MILE RELAY”, “Guy Turner 1961 440 YARD DASH”. Other than that, we never knew the “old” guys...except “Starr Keesler 1937 BROAD JUMP”... who in 1964 was the Chairman of the Okemos Board of Education! Wow, was that an old record!

For 2 years, I stared at that board and finally noticed that the name “Ewing” appeared. Little did we know, if the “old” records had been on display since 1960, we would have seen the name “Ewing” two more times under the 880 RELAY and SPRINT MEDLEY RELAY. The 1963 German student, Hans Wiegand, had been the only threat to breaking the 100 and 220-yard dash, but no one else threatened the 100 and 220 for many years to come!

Never accused of rushing in to anything, 50 years later, I looked at that picture again, and stared...who was this guy Ewing? I emailed the Okemos Alumni Association's Historian and Genealogist, Sherrie Paty '66, to ask her if she could find anything about Richard Ewing '53...10 minutes later, she emailed me back, “He's alive and well, living in Harrison, Michigan, here's his phone number”! Sherrie is amazing. (Sherrie has taken on the task of finding or writing the life story or tribute of everyone from Okemos High School...ever!) So, 11 minutes after I asked the question, I was talking to Joann Ewing...”Hello, Mrs. Ewing...did your husband go to Okemos High School?” “Why yes...would you like to talk to him...he's outside, I'll call him.” Now I'm excited, but what do I ask? I don't know anything about him, except that he could sprint in 1953!

“Hi Dick, I'm Rod Ellis from Okemos 1965...so you went to Okemos in 1953 and ran track?”

“Why yes...I haven't had anyone ask me that in 60 years!”


“I see from some old yearbooks that you were quite a sprinter...you didn't happen to keep and still have a scrapbook?”

“Why yes...I'll look around and send it to you.”

A week later, looking through his scrapbook, the story was all there...and what a story...one of the greatest athletes from Okemos, and I had only seen him as a name on the wall!

It's a nice, thick scrapbook with many newspaper articles. He and his relay teammates got lots of press and the press photographer gave him many of the glossy's that appeared in the newspaper. His scrapbook cover is a press glossy of his winning and record setting 880-yard relay team after they won the State Meet in May, 1953.


With Ewing anchoring, they clocked a record time of 1:36.7. They would have been "on the wall" if Okemos had a display before Jon Overholt and Gary Sturk hung their own, new 1963 school record for the 880 relay.



High School began the fall of 1949 for Richard Ralph "Dick" Ewing. Raised by his grandparents on Grand River Rd., family guidance got thinner quickly when his grandfather died his freshman year. His grandmother was a great source of encouragement, but training and development was completely on his own. Dick thought football was his calling, encouraged by some fast footwork in a 3rd place finish in the 1948 (7th Grade) Okemos Inter-Class Track Meet on a Mile Medley Relay Team and a 3rd place in the 1949 (8th grade) Inter-Class in the 100 Yard Dash. He thought George Richards was a good football coach and a great motivator. "The uniforms were worn out and the pads thin, but we always played all out." Some inner drive pushed him and he earned a varsity football letter his Freshman year, Fall 1949.

Dick trained by himself, seven days a week,..”ran down the Grand Trunk Rail Road, next to the rail, stones and all. I was self-taught...coaches didn’t know anything about track.” Dick was pretty much on his own. At a young age, his parents in Haslett couldn’t raise all 9 children, so his grandparents took over the responsibility for Dick. When not in school or training, Dick was working. First a paper route, then in the late 1940’s he carried beer cases for Paul Revere’s Bar on Grand River. His grandparents lived a block behind Paul Revere’s. Revere’s was owned by Paul Luck (historical note: between the 1970’s and 2015, Paul Revere’s was owned by Okemos grad, Jim Driscoll ’63). Dick also worked as a busboy at Warren Populars Fine Dining, located across from Paul Revere’s.

His Senior Class yearbook picture summarizes his High School career and adds the quote “Speed is the essence of all things.” Although a Senior quotation, he showed promise early.

Leslie's County League Throne Seen Tottering

Leslie high's two-year Ingham County league track reign may end Wednesday morning when Coach Walt Gephart's Blackhawks defend their title in the annual league meet

at Michigan State college starting at 9:30 a. m.

Holt, aided by Williamston and Fowlerville, teams that are sure to cut into Leslie's point-total, rates as the pre-meet favorite. Coach Harold Wells' Holt squad is strong in the dashes and relays, and appears to have the overall power to knock the Blackhawks off their perch.

Okemos, which was edged out by Leslie last spring, has had its ranks thinned by graduation, but has a handful of individual performers that are counted on for points.

Haslett, Dansville, and Stockbridge, schools that are just starting expanded track activities, will all enter small squads.

Believing that 50 points will win the championship, rival coaches are spotting Holt 18 points in the dashes, first in the shotput, quarter-mile, both relays, and enough lower place positions to easily annex the crown. Ben Hope, who as a sophomore last year set a new league record in the 440, has been switched to the dashes and has turned in the best times in the league so far this season. Larry Guile, also of Holt, is expected to follow Hope to the tape for second place.

Holt's Mel Morrison is expected to replace Hope as the top quarter-miler, and will team with the two dashmen and Bob Jones to give the Rams the mile relay team.

Okemos Marks Up Year's First Win

 HASLETT, Oct. 20 — Okemos high's football team scored its first victory of the season in five games here Thursday night by downing Stockbridge, 18 to 13, in an Ingham County league tilt. Bill Black passed for touchdowns, and McDonald scored a third as Okemos took an 18 to 0 lead at the end of the third period. Stockbridge, also seeking its first decision of the year, scored twice in the final period. Dick Worden and Bob Lambert tallied the touchdowns.

The Quakers medley relay team of Roger Wills, John Lewis, Chuck Lundberg and Ben Summers edged Howell for Eastern's other first place.

Three freshmen—Richard Ewing, Gerry Rossa and Duane Randall—carried most of the scoring load in Okemos' victory over the Shamrocks. Ewing paced both of the dash events for 10 points, Rossa won the quarter-mile, and Randall added a first in the half mile.

The Capital Circuit track squad carved the first notch in The State Journal I.C. - C. C. trophy Monday evening at Michigan State college, but the Ingham County league entries were right in stride with the Circuit in providing top individual performances.
Paced by its league champion, Howell, the Circuit picked away 83 points to the County's 34 to win the first annual inter-league meet before the new Lansing area conference.
Loren Wells, the Circuit's honorary coach, accepted the most trophy for the winners from George S. Alderton, sports editor of The State Journal.



12 Schools Ready Stars For IC-CC Journal Meet

Almost perfect track weather is helping the Ingham County and Capital Circuit league coaches tune up their athletes for the first annual State Journal I. C. - C. inter-league dual meet at Michigan State college next Monday evening.

The two league squads were named at the conference meets last week. Individuals on the teams, which represent 12 different schools in the Lansing area, have been working out all week preparing for the meet.

The four field events will open the meet at 5:15 p. m. The first races will be held at 6 o'clock. There will be no admission charge.

On the basis of comparative times, heights and distances in the two loop meets, the County squad turned in the best performances in 10 of the 13 events, but still will rate as the underdog Monday. Rain and a muddy track slowed down the Circuit's times in its conference test last Friday.

The County should hold its own in the field events and relays, but will probably fall behind the Circuit in the distance races, the hurdles and the dashes.

On paper the Circuit has the fastest set of high hurdlers with the John Milbourne of Eaton Rapids, Hans Kardel and Wally Bruce of Charlotte giving the CC a chance to slam the event. Kardel and Milbourne have both run the event through Milbourne's winning time in the CC meet was :16.7.

Holt's Jim Verplanck, who won the County race with a .163 effort, is the IC's best bet to out in for some points by taking one of the three places in the event. Danville's Bob Thompson and Fowlerville's Norm Miller complete the County trio of high hurdlers. Thompson's and Miller's best times have been shaded by Verplanck's and the CC hurdlers' all season.

The County will be stronger in the low, with either Miller or Verplanck capable of winning the event. Holt's Bob Hanes is the third IC entry in the low hurdles. Miller toured the 160-yard course in :28-flat to win the County title.

Milbourne, Jim Swank, also of Eaton Rapids, and Howell's Bill Hilton will carry the CC colors in the low. Milbourne paced his conference field in :28.2 with Swank and Hilton finishing just a step behind. Top season performances of all six entries have been about the same, making this one of the closest races of the meet.

Dick Ewing of Okemos is the County's leading threat against the Circuit's four-man dash squad. The Chief's sprinter was a double-winner in the County meet, winning the century in :20.7 and the 220 in :23.8. Ewing will have Williamson's pair of speedsters, Lyle Burkle and Jim Harris, as running mates in the 100. Mel Morrison of Holt will team with Harris and Ewing in the 220.

The County boys will meet Charlotte's Dale Rolfe and Everett's Jim Diederichs in both sprints. Glen Gray of Everett will run the 220 for the CC, and Hilton of Howell will race in the 100.

Rolfe won the short dash in the CC meet in the rain in :11.1 seconds, but is capable of doing much better under more favorable conditions. Diederichs set the pace in the CC 220 with a winning time of :25.2.

Burkley picked up a dozen points in the dashes. Other point winners for Williamson were Chuck Powell in the pole vault and Glen Lounsbury in the high jump. Mel Elmurry was also fourth in the high jump. Morrison paced Holt in its bid for the title with 11 points which was high for the Morrison meet. Morrison was first in the vault, second in the 250 and fourth in the 100-yard dash, besides running a leg on the 880 relay team.

Jim Verplanck of Holt and Norm Miller of Fowlerville traded first and second places in the hurdles races. Verplanck won the high, Gene Pearce missed a league record by $\frac{1}{4}$ of an inch in winning the shotput for Holt. Pearce's winning toss was 48 feet 8 inches.

Okemos won four first places with Dick Ewing accounting for two of them in the dashes. Gene Harris won the 440 and a medley relay team of Leroy Webb, Keith Palmerston, Dick Stetler and Dick Hartsuff paced the field.


Holt's Dick Flake was less than an inch from the high jump record with a winning leap of 5 feet 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches. The record stands at 5-8 $\frac{1}{2}$. Herbie Hagenbuch tallied all of Hasett's points with a first in the broad jump, fifth in the century, a tie for second in the pole vault and a tie for fifth in the high jump.



Okemos grad Jim Breckenfeld '60 recalled seeing Ewing play football and said "I don't remember if they had All-State recognition back then, but Dick Ewing sure deserved it." The 1952 team picture with #65 sitting with the game ball...why not...Ewing carried it



most of the time for four years!

"We went 'all out' and never saved ourselves for the next game. Got knocked out in the Haslett game and just laid

there for 20 minutes...got up and played the rest of the game." He added, "They'd never do that today!" Dick said he did get a better helmet and shoulder pads out of the ordeal. "In those days, Haslett was the big rival, 'the enemy'...they gang tackled, punched and stuffed sand in my mouth in the pile and even got my pants ripped off...team stood around me while I switched pants." Dick confessed, "A few years later, I went into enemy territory and married a Haslett girl."

"Whoa, let me talk to Joann! ...so Joann, how did you two meet?" "My sister fixed us up on a blind date in 1956. She said he was a nice person, a football player and a track star. He was very modest." And then she recalled they had "met" years before at a Haslett football game, "Dick got knocked out and just lay there...we didn't pay a lot of attention...he was on the 'other' team, and Haslett won!"

Dick was not only honored as an outstanding athlete by Okemos High School and the newspapers, but the colleges took notice also.
