NUT COOKIES AND MOUND CANDY BARS, GOOD EATING ANYTIME

Pinckney -- Seventeen years ago Roy and Shirley Klotz were married in the small town of Okemos, and for the past eleven years they have lived in Livingston county. Four years ago they purchased their 243 acre farm near Pinckney. Mr. Klotz has been in both beef and dairy farming, but now that he has his own farm they are milking a herd of 45 cows.

When asked why they farm, Mrs. Klotz quickly replied, "It is the love of the land and being able to provide for the needs of so many other people, that keeps us farming."

They have four daughters and one son, all work together in the farm operation. Sixteen year old Pam and thirteen year old Connie are a real asset on the farm; they help with the chores including the milking. They are both active in 4-H and they have their own cattle.

Amy, eleven, and Carol, nine share in the chores with calves and chickens. Amy is in band at school, and is beginning her first year in 4-H.



The only boy in the family is seven year old Chris. He has a family of rabbits to care for and helps with chores.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Klotz are active 4-H leaders. Roy has been a livestock leader for two years, and is now serving on the 4-H council. For the past five years Shirley has been a handicraft leader.

"Our cook" explains that most of her hobbies are enjoyed with the girls. They do their own sewing, and with the scraps of material they are making crazy quilts. The younger girls cut the pieces out and the older ones do the sewing. It is Mom's job to quilt the pieces.

She said, "It is quite an achievement to see a box of material made into a warm coy blanket. We also knit and crochet, anything from a stocking caps used to face the cold winter chores, to a fancy sweater for school wear."

Mrs. Klotz says she does the usual chores on a diary farm from washing the milkers to helping nurse the sick calves and cows. Her list includes such jobs as baling hay, mending fences and building gates. She also keeps the farm books, and cow records.

She relates one of her most interesting experience in this way: "When I first moved onto a dairy farm, I was very green about cows and freshening (giving birth to their young). I remember I was in the process of baking a cake and needed an egg, so I went down to the chicken coop and got a nice fresh egg. I could hear this groaning noise from the barn, so by nature I went in. There laid a cow beginning to have her calf."

"I just had to watch this moment of life, but when the calf was born I headed for the house. I could not get started back to that cake for an hour. Of course, this event happens quite frequently on a farm, so once again I had the opportunity to watch another birth, but this time I had all five children lined up watching with me. I knew at the time what an experience they were going through." To Shirley this is just another plus to life on the farm.

For the past few years, Mrs. Klotz has had an accounting business in her own home. She tells us, "I work mainly with farmers, small business and income tax. Farming is a business that needs to keep an accurate set of records. More are constantly being required. If my small part can be of help in these trying days, then my ambitions have been filled."

She adds, "With a large family, life can be so trying but we have found that by sharing the work, love and loyalty we can grow as a proud family together."

The recipes she wishes to share are from a collection used during the holidays, however they may be used for a number of occasions with as much satisfaction. The nut cookies are excellent for teas, or when packing a box of "goodies."

NUT COOKIES

- 1/2 pound butter
- 4 tablespoons white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup pecan nuts (ground finely)

Mix well into small balls and bake at 250 degrees for 1 hour. Roll in powdered sugar while warm and again when cold.
