


I moved around from Albuquerque, Pine Ridge, SD, Ft. Defiance, AZ, Window Rock, AZ and finally to Tuba. This 30 years was awesome, working in health care with our Native Americans! I could have made more money but life isn't always about money...the people, the places, the satisfaction of a job well done. I learned to love the high desert and still miss the Navajo Reservation...it grows on you. Nothing like being at a Pow Wow or sing out in some lonesome spot in a red rock canyon with the sound of voices and drums and bells ringing from the canyon walls! The smell of juniper burning and fried bread in the air. Being good friends with some of the Natives allowed me to be a party to special ceremonies that most whites aren't allowed to see. I can recall a number of times being in a Hogan with maybe 30 or 40 brown Navajo faces around me...the only white face in the bunch.

After retiring from IHS I moved to SLC with Della and Ian. Stayed at home and upgraded our first home together with bath rooms, kitchen, wood floors cabinets, you name it. I learned a lot with the doing and since health care tends to be rather thankless, you don't get a lot of thanks from other health care providers, the hands on of work was satisfying. I went back to work as a Lab Manager in a couple of places here in or near SLC. Even changed my work and became a Safety Officer for a reference laboratory!

I finally got out of the health care rat race about 6 years ago when I went to work for USANA Health Sciences. I started working in Chemistry and then was asked to apply for the Microbiology Supervisor position. So I have been in that role for about 4 of the 5 years. Great place to work, young people for the most part and highly motivated sales force since they

are working for themselves. Lots of benefits, full


