Reva Doreen Hoyt, daughter of Charles Walter (1890-1968) and Jennie H. (Havens) (1893-1982) Hoyt, was born 17 August 1924, Midland County, Michigan. She graduated in 1942 from a local high school and then worked in the medical field for several years before attending Greenville College (now Greenville University), Greenville, Bond County, Illinois. Greenville is a liberal arts school affiliated with the Free Methodist Church. Reva obtained her BA degree from Greenville in 1950.

For several years Reva taught school in Midland County. She began her long career with Okemos School in 1957, retiring in 1980. "Miss Hoyt" became a fixture in Okemos Middle School, teaching at both 7th and 8th grade levels. She taught high school pupils for at least one year, 1959-1960, but returned to her Middle School pupils thereafter.

Reva taught for years at the Middle School level. Anyone coming through Okemos Middle School had her! Unfortunately, I can only vaguely remember her class. She was a very kind person but had discipline in her classroom. I can still see Miss Hoyt "bustling around".....efficient, organized and knowledgeable.
