



Our hopes are met in you.



Dear Parent:

We are writing this letter to give you information regarding some of the recent school events that affect the senior class.

Some time ago the senior class voted to have a senior trip instead of a skip day. However, we gave them a day to visit certain business places in the city of Lansing.

During Hat and Cane Day, they took advantage of the situation to make it rather difficult for some of the teachers and we called them together and talked the matter over with them at which time, they agreed to "settle down" and work for the remainder of the school year.

Yesterday they were given nearly two class periods to go to Okemos for "Swing-Out"; wearing caps and gowns; but they boarded a Short Way Bus, went to East Lansing and returned after having spent an additional one and one-half class hours. This was designated as skipping school and they were suspended according to the rules which have been in effect all year.
