
Frederick Alexander "Fred" Swegles, Jr., only son of Frederick Alexander, Sr. (1890-1965) and Renzella (Sprik) (1890-1979), was born 12 June 1922, Lansing, Ingham County, Michigan. He graduated from Eastern High School, Lansing in January 1941 and furthered his education at Michigan State College where he was a member of the Michigan State band and ROTC.

With the advent of Pearl Harbor, Fred reported to active duty in the US Navy. In 2007 a reporter from The Times Herald newspaper interviewed Fred about his World War II experiences.

Swegles of Port Huron was attending Michigan State University when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. A member of the ROTC, he was in training by February 1942.

Eventually, he ended up aboard the U.S.S.

Hornet aircraft carrier, reading charts in the navigation department.

"One day I went back to my quarters and there was nothing there but my shoelaces," he said.

He went to report a theft. When the clerk asked for his name, the response was, "Oh, we've been looking for you."

Swegles was handed a sextant and an attaché case and ordered up to the deck, where he was loaded onto a SBD Dauntless dive bomber. Moments later the plane was in the air and the pilot was asking Swegles where they were going. The pilot told Swegles he was the navigator for the bomber wing.

Mr. Swegles, whose birthplace was Lansing, graduated from Albion College with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He taught four years in Okemos, Mich., High School before coming to Port Huron to teach special education at Washington Jr. High School.

He spent four years in Naval aviation, and 10 years in industrial engineering before entering the teaching profession. He is married and has four children: Frederick, 9. Victoria, 6, Pamela, 4, and Kimberly, 9 months. "I didn't know what in the world was going on," Swegles said.

He witnessed several major carrier battles in the Pacific, including the Battle of the Santa Cruz Islands, at which the *Hornet* was sunk. His plane landed on the beach of an unknown, inhabited island, unable to take off. An English-speaking doctor helped them contact the Navy.

An even closer call came earlier, perhaps during the Battle of Midway. Under heavy fire, Swegles opened his hatch to find the plane on fire. He started kicking at the damaged fuselage and was sucked out into the air.

Flailing around for his ripcord, he pulled something on the front of his pack.

"It opened up and it was the raft,: Swegles said. "The dumb thing inflated, and I'm going down like a rock."

Eventually he found and opened his parachute, which landed on top of him when he hit the water.

When he finally got free, the raft was floating next to him

"I got on the raft thinking, "Well this is it," he said, and started singing to himself the hymn *This World Is Not My Home*.

It wasn't long, however, before an American submarine surfaced nearby.

The bomber's pilot and gunner were never found.

After honorable discharge from the US Navy, Fred married Shirley Jean Young on 7 February 1949. Fred went back to college and obtained both BA and MA degrees. Shirley too completed college and became, like Fred, a school teacher. Fred taught at Okemos High School in the 1958-1959

year. In 1960 he moved to the Port Huron area and began teaching special education in the Port Huron school system.

He and Shirley were interred Lakeside Cemetery, Port Huron.

Mr. Swegles was a teacher with the Port Huron Area School District. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II.

Just last week, Fred went to Washington, D.C. on the Honor Flight for World War II veterans. He was a longtime member of Griswold Street Baptist Church where he served as a deacon and Sunday school teacher. He was past president of St. Clair County Gideons International and was very involved with Child Evangelism Fellowship. He was a founding member and Emeritus Board Member of the Michigan Protection & Advocacy Service.

He is survived by his wife, Donna; a son, Frederick "Rick" Swegles and his partner, Sue Fahey; five daughters, Dr. Victoria Swegles, Pamela (David) Van Soest, Kimberly (Scott) Siple, Michelle (Ali) Guvendiren and Sandy (Charles) Badley; six stepchildren, Gerald (Darlene) Rome, Cindy (Kevin) Kole, Rebecca (Terry) Harrington, Jane (John) Hampton, William (Kelly) Rome and Donald (Karen) Rome; 18 grandchildren; 11 step grandchildren; 18 great grandchildren; and seven step great grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a sister, Jenny Hinkle.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. on Saturday, June 14, 2014 in Griswold Street Baptist Church. The Reverend James Pettit will officiate. Burial will be in Lakeside Cemetery. His grandchildren will serve as pallbearers. Military honors will be conducted under the auspices of the U.S. Navy.
