
William Hall Taylor, son of Wilber Fisk (1860-1935) and Maude Beulah (Metcalf) Taylor, was born 4 March 1898 New Era, Oceana County, Michigan. His World War I Draft Registration, 18 September 1918, located him working for his father on the farm, Oceana County, and he was enumerated still living at home in the 1920 Oceana County, Michigan US Federal Census. William graduated from Michigan State College about 1923. He was a department editor for the MSC campus yearbook, "Wolverine." On the 1940 US Federal Census form, William stated he had 5 years of college.



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William married Edna Wilhelmina Rabe 30 July 1923, Claybanks, Oceana County. Edna, born 15 October 1899, was employed as a school teacher at the time of their wedding.

OKEMOS SCHOOL NAMES TEACHERS


<u>Three New Instructors Will Be on Staff for the</u> <u>Consolidated School</u>

Okemos, May 19 - The Okemos consolidated school will have three new teachers next year. **William E. Taylor**, Michigan State college graduate, who will get an advanced degree at Harvard university this summer, will be superintendent and teacher agriculture.

William and Edna began their family together about the same time he became the Okemos Consolidated School superintendent. Their first born, Jean Ellen,



was born 1926 and on 4 October 1928 they added a second baby girl, Donna Mae. Unfortunately Donna had a congenital heart defect and died 11 November 1928,



Sparrow Hospital, Lansing, Ingham County. The baby was interred Glendale Cemetery, Okemos.

OFFER SUPERINTENDENT THREE-YEAR CONTRACT

Okemos School board Seek to Engage William H. Taylor to Remain in School

Okemos, Sept. 11 - Supt. **William H. Taylor** was offered a three-year renewal of his contract at the regular meeting of the Okemos board of education, Monday evening. This will take effect at the close of the present school year, extending to 1934.

The early consideration of the contract, which does not expire until next August was occasioned by a communication from the Michigan Education association, urging that superintendents of all Michigan schools, be elected a year prior to the expiration of their contracts. The reason given was that the school seeking a new superintendent might have time to give the matter careful consideration, and that the superintendent leaving a school might have plenty of time to find a new situation.

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William left Okemos Consolidated in 1933.

OKEMOS CLUB PLANS FOR FAREWELL PARTY

Okemos, Aug. 3 - Members and friends of the Alaiedon Farmers' club are planning a farewell party for **Mr. and Mrs. William H. Taylor** who have been members of that club for the past six years. The party will be held at the Taylor home, Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

William and Edna were divorced in Ingham County 12 August 1939. Edna moved, with the two daughters, Jean Ellen and Mary Alice, to Mt. Pleasant, Isabella County, Michigan, according to the 1940 US Federal Census. Edna, who never remarried, died 18 April 1987, Muskegon County, Michigan. She was interred Oak Grove Cemetery, Montague, Muskegon County.

On 3 May 1941, East Lansing, Ingham County, William married widow Margaret (Bowerman) Reed. Margaret listed herself as employed with home extension work on the marriage license. William said he was teacher. Margaret, born 23 November 1899, Ontario Province, Canada, was the widow of LeRoy Reed. Mr. Reed, born 19 July 1897, succumbed to multiple sclerosis 8 January 1937.

By the early 1950's William was established as superintendent of what is now Vicksburg Community Schools, Kalamazoo County, Michigan.

SAFECRACKERS GET \$714 ON SIX JOBS

Four Schools, Two Lakeview Business Places Entered

Four schools in this area were broken into and their safes burglarized, and two Lakeview business places were broken into last might.

The "take" amounted to \$714 in cash,\$30 in checks and a pistol. Police are comparing techniques used in the burglaries in an effort to link several together as possibly the work of one gang.

Demolish Vicksburg Safe

At Vicksburg the thieves gained \$79.40 after practically tearing the safe apart. Entrance was made by breaking a lock on a classroom window,

forcing the lock on the door from the room into the hall and then prying open the office door. The steel case front of the safe was cut out much as one would use a can opener to open a tin can, according to Supt. W. H. Taylor, then the fireproofing material in the safe was dug out, after which the combination was knocked off. The school board had been in session in the building until 1 a.m. the robbery was discovered by Harlow Kott, school janitor, at 6 a.m.

Note: Three school houses were mentioned in the 16 January 1954 newspaper write up. The Briggs school house was located in Pavilion Township, Jenkinson school house in Brady Township, and Prairie Grove school house in Schoolcraft Township, all in Kalamazoo County.

JAIL 3 VICKSBURG BOYS FOR SCHOOL VANDALISM

Kalamazoo - Three Vicksburg boys were jailed here today on charges of damaging two Vicksburg area schools so badly they had to be closed.

Charged with vandalism were David Mathis, 17, a service station attendant; George Hodgeman, 18, a garbage collector and Victor Michaelson, 18, who is unemployed.

Supt. William Taylor said he was forced to close the Briggs and Jenkinson schools because all the windows had been broken and it was impossible to keep them heated. Taylor said wall clocks were smashed, equipment overturned and supplies scattered about the floors. A piano also was kicked in at one of the schools.

The three youths also were accused of damaging the Prairie Grove School, which was not closed.

William died 14 December 1974, Kalamazoo County. Margaret, died 2 February 1984, Wayne County, Michigan. They were interred Schoolcraft Township Cemetery, Vicksburg.
